






Prepare a Memorable Introduction

You need to be prepared with a memorable introduction (yburto 20second elevator pitch). This intro**ch**ion should include

- x a brief statement about who you are
- x what you do/have done
- x and (potentially) what you would like to do in the future

This introduction could be used at networking events, on phone calls or in emails to potential contacts, or in **bri**mation interviews. You can shorten, lengthen, or change this introduction to fit the situation you are in.

- x What skills have you found essential for success in this occupation?
- x Could you tell me about one of the main challenges you face in your position?

Communication/Tone of Voicerbal and NorVerbal Cues)

At any networking event or during any chance encounter with a potential employer, your communication style is xtremely important when you wartb make a good first impression. Albert Mehrabian published the relative importance of verbal and nonverbassages anis known for $Z] \cdot /38055\%$ Rule_which states that meaning in speech is conveyed in these proportions: words account for just7% tone of voice accounts for 380% of meaning, and body language accounts for 360%.

Follow the tips below to ensure yourerbal AND nonverbal communicationare friendly, professional, and will set you apart from the crowd:


